ADVICES AND QUERIES TENTH MONTH: Personal Relationship

In daily relationships with others, both inside and outside the home, our lives as Friends speak immediately and lastingly. In these relationships, our faith may also be severely tested. We are called to respond to that of God in everyone: we are all children of God. Friends celebrate any union that is dedicated to mutual love and respect, regardless of the unique make-up of the family. We strive to create homes where the Spirit of the Divine resides at the center and where the individual genius of each member is respected and nurtured.

Human sexuality is a divine gift, forming part of the complex union of body, mind and spirit that is our humanity. In a loving adult relationship in a context of mutual responsibility, sexuality brings delight, fulfillment and celebration.

The presence of children carries a special blessing as well as responsibility. Children bring unique spiritual gifts — wonder, resiliency, playfulness and more. Recognize and honor the Divine Light within children and treat them with the dignity and respect that is due to all people. Listen to and learn from children; share with them those values and practices that are central to our own lives. Special care must be given to resolving problems between adults and children in a manner that gives equal weight to the feelings and needs of both children and adults. Tender parenting is one of the critically important peace vocations in our society. Make every effort to offer all parents the personal and institutional support that this challenging work requires.

Take a strong stand against any form of abuse, whether that abuse is minor or severe, and whether it is emotional, physical or sexual in nature. The terrible impact of abuse on the most vulnerable members of our families creates lifelong suffering for its victims and is a major source of violence in our society. Perpetrators are themselves usually victims of similar violence and should be approached with compassion as well as firmness.

- Do I make my home a place of friendliness, joy, and peace, where residents and visitors feel God's presence?
- Are my sexual practices consistent with my spiritual beliefs and free of manipulation and exploitation?
- What barriers keep me from responding openly and lovingly to each person?
- Do we open our thoughts, beliefs, and deep understandings to our children and others who share our lives and our hospitality?
- Do we provide our children and young adults with a framework for active, ongoing participation in the Meeting?

Two months ago we were a few thousand dollars behind & I asked for more financial help. Many were able to help and by the end of our fiscal year, 9-30-23, our expenses were completely matched by contributions and we were also able to pay a portion of our budgeted donations.

Our General Fund contributions received in fy 2023 (\$14,561) approximately equaled our expenses & outbound donations (\$14,352). The outbound donations were paid at 30% of what was budgeted, but two months ago I feared we might have no money for those donations.


The "Fund Balances" & the "Actual Spending vs Budget" reports are available in the Meeting House and by contacting me. The restricted funds are unchanged since August.

Quaker Testimony: What We Witness to the World by Paul Buckley

Synopsis


As a non-credal religious body, the Religious Society of Friends has long been known to others primarily for its outward activities or testimonies. This pamphlet explores some historic and more recent roles played by testimonies in the Religious Society of Friends: What is a Quaker testimony? How have Quaker testimonies originated, changed over time, and – in some cases – disappeared? What roles have the testimonies played in the life of our Society? And what role do they play – or might they play – in our own spiritual lives?

The first half of the pamphlet focuses on Quaker witness in the Society's first two hundred years. The second half traces the emergence and development of testimonies since the 1940s – particularly the designation of SPICES (simplicity, peace, integrity, community, equality, and stewardship or sustainability) as "the Quaker testimonies" – and the dangers this poses to Quakerism. Discussion questions are included.


Traveling in the Dark: A Memoir by Donna Eder *Synopsis*

130 former students, campers, staff, and Board members (many accompanied by family and other loved ones) joined current staff and Board members to reconnect—socialize—share memories and photos—make apple-pear cider from Woolman orchard fruit—eat delicious meals—cuddle into modernized, yet familiar rooms—explore the beloved campus in the rain—play music—dance—and worship together. Lisa Frankel and Catherine Lenox launched <u>*The Woolman Way: A History of John Woolman School*</u> with illustrations by Sophie Wood Brinker.

On Saturday night, Sandra Schwartz, co-clerk of the College Park Friends Educational Association, began with a reminder from our last update: "In considering a sale, in addition to the commitment to meet our financial obligations, we looked to the purpose of Woolman that students, staff, Board members and donors have contributed to, and how that purpose might continue to come alive here. We are in negotiations with another public-benefit non-profit with similar values. While there are many factors to sort out, we are very hopeful. As soon as the purchaser can be made public, it will be announced."

She continued with an update, "The Woolman Board is delighted to announce that we are working toward an agreement with the Nevada City Rancheria Nisenan Tribe, via its tribally-guided non-profit organization, CHIRP (California Heritage Indigenous Research Project). Our talks are productive and full of good will on both sides."


Sitting next to Sandra as she spoke was Shelly Covert, the Executive Director of CHIRP and the Nevada City Rancheria Nisenan Tribal Spokesperson, and her mother and tribal elder, Ginger Covert.

Many people communicated delight at the announcement, while others raised concerns, asking for details about the decision and decision-making process. Emotions of all kinds were expressed.

Later, the Board collected written questions and concerns (as well as offers of support and encouragement) to which we are in the process of writing responses. These, along with additional updates about the process will be sent out soon.

Quaker Lobby Calls for Urgent De-escalation of Violence in Israel and Gaza

Washington, DC - The Friends Committee on National Legislation (FCNL) condemned the attack by Hamas on Israel and Israel's retaliatory violence while calling on world leaders to press for de-escalation and restraint in Gaza and southern Israel moving forward. FCNL also reminded policymakers that violence committed by Hamas does not justify the collective punishment of nearly two million Palestinian civilians living in Gaza.



"As Quakers, we deeply mourn the loss of all lives and pray for those who have lost loved ones due to this latest escalation," said Bridget Moix, FCNL's general secretary. "We firmly condemn all violence against civilians and urge the U.S. government and global leaders to prioritize an immediate ceasefire, de-escalation and restraint to prevent further civilian harm."

These tragic events, including the deaths of hundreds of Israeli and Palestinian civilians and the taking of dozens of Israeli prisoners, underscore the pressing need to ensure self-determination, equality, and fundamental human rights for Israelis and Palestinians alike. Authentic security is attainable through the promotion of a culture of peace, including a healthy environment, economic opportunity, democratic participation, access to education, and personal well-being.

"True peace can only be achieved through peaceful means," said Hassan El-Tayyab, FCNL's legislative director for Middle East policy. "These terrible attacks and violent response increase our resolve to protect innocent life and advocate for an end to all forms of injustice in Israel and the occupied Palestinian territories. Policymakers in the United States must refrain from further militarizing this conflict and work to ensure that our military assistance is never used to violate Palestinian human rights. Only by addressing core systemic issues, including decades of institutionalized oppression and collective punishment of Palestinians through brutal military occupation and a 16-year Gaza blockade, will Israelis and Palestinians live in peace."
