Clerks' Remarks and Query:

Dorothy Henderson has been practicing calling this Meeting *for Worship* for Business. From John 3: We don't know where the wind comes from, and we don't know where it's going. It is the same for Spirit.

Our plans get washed away by life. What would it be like if we let Spirit come into our Meeting for Worship for Business and let Spirit be the guide.

Have you experienced Spirit coming into the room for Meeting for Worship for Business? What does it mean to you?

Friends shared out of silence:

- When there is conflict during Meeting for Worship for Business, we can go back into silence and allow Spirit to guide us.
- A friend shared a wonderful experience of how a contentious meeting could be turned around to a meeting full of worship and awe.
- Another friend expressed gratitude to the members in Meeting who remember this is a Meeting for Worship.
- When someone speaks from the Spirit, and through silent waiting, weighty concerns can become clear.
- One friend hopes to feel the same "quaking" when they speak out of worship, as when they speak during Meeting for Worship for Business. She mentioned the qualities of compassion, confidence, courage, creativity, curiosity, clarity, and calmness (from Internal Family Systems, Richard Schwartz) indicators of being in the True Self/God.

Dear Friends

Pausing for a moment to think about the second decade of the 21st century, one could say the Grass Valley Friends Meeting (GVFM) has demonstrated great resiliency. The World Health Organization declared covid-19 a pandemic in March of 2020. In September of 2021 the Jones Fire swept through the Sierra Friends Center's campus, burning many acres of land and affecting numerous lives. During this time the Grass Valley Friends Meeting House contents were packed into a storage container and Meeting for Worship relied on Zoom technology. In 2022, the Meeting moved back into the Meeting House and returned our Library to its shelves.

Throughout all these challenges, our Meeting has remained intact. While mourning the loss of three dearly beloved Friends, we have welcomed four new members and sustained an active group of worshippers both inperson and via Zoom.

Our Meeting is resilient because you are a part of our Friends Community. Your participation in Meeting for Worship and Friends' activities is our strength. Your financial support allows our Meeting to take care of basic expenses (paying rent, the Meeting's webpage, our newsletter, three publication subscriptions¹, committee needs, and liability insurance). Funds also go to the greater Religious Society of Friends including memberships in College Park Quarterly Meeting, and Pacific Yearly Meeting. This year included three scholarships to Friends General Conference in Oregon.

The approved budget for FY 23-24(\$15,235) is a slight increase over FY22-23's actual expenses (\$14,352).

With your financial contributions, Grass Valley Friends Meeting can meet its costs of service and operations. Your contribution of \$40/household each month allows us to meet the Meeting's budget goal for FY 23-24. A contribution of \$50/household each month would allow us to restore several items that have been greatly reduced or eliminated from our pre-Covid budgets². We honor and respect the level of generosity you can share.

What, If Anything, Are We Doing To Stop Injustices Having To Do With Race And Hispanic Origin? Submitted by Don McCormick

I was struck by something I read in an article in the March, 2017 issue of *Friends Journal*—"Stumbling Forward toward Racial Justice among Friends" by Lucy Duncan and Noah White. One of the authors, Noah White (who is African American) wrote:

I grew to understand that Quaker spaces were places for people not of color to prove how much they weren't contributing to the injustices affecting people of color by showing how good they are. It was not a place where anything was actually going to be done to stop the injustices from happening. As my consciousness grew, I found myself in Quaker spaces less frequently until I stopped attending altogether.

I think one of the many reasons this issue concerned me was that I was recently told that Nevada County is the whitest of all counties in California. I found this hard to believe until I looked at the census data. Nevada County is the whitest county. Also, it was interesting to realize that African Americans make up one of the smallest groups. They make up only 0.7% of the people in the county. American Indians and Alaska Natives make up 1.3%, Asians make up 1.7%, people of two or more races make up 3.5%, and Hispanics or Latinos make up 10.4%.

The dates are January 18-21, 2024 online only.

The program includes four main components:

- Connection to Spirit

Thursday night: We open worship and an opportunity to explore what our hopes are for the conference. We'll meet in reflection groups, which will meet daily. Saturday: Two tracks. Each track includes a plenary followed by workshops. Friends may choose between:

- Next Steps in becoming an actively anti-racist faith community: Vanessa Julye, plenary speaker, followed by workshops with David Etheridge, Janice Domanik & Beca Haines Rosenberg, Clinton Pettus and additional Friends.
- Changing Structures for Changing Times: Plenary speakers are Paul Buckley, Rashid Darden and Barry Crossno followed by workshops with Emily Provance, Susan Loucks and Your Turn, Your Story: a chance to share across Yearly Meetings

Sunday: "Speak and Be Heard: Voices of Younger Friends." Several younger Friends will speak about Quakerism, Quaker structure, or their sense of belonging followed by discussion groups to reflect on the messages we've heard.

Central Coast Monthly Meeting Statement Supporting Chumash Heritage National Marine Sanctuary October 2023

CCFM 2023-10-A Central Coast Friends Meeting approves submitting a statement of support to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) in favor of creation of the Chumash Heritage National Marine Sanctuary.

STATEMENT SUPPORTING CHUMASH HERITAGE NATIONAL MARINE SANCTUARY

The Central Coast Friends Meeting (Quakers) offers this statement of support for the proposed Chumash Heritage National Marine Sanctuary. Our principles of harmony with nature and of right relationships with Creation bring us to make this statement. We support the establishment of the Chumash Heritage National Marine Sanctuary using the largest possible contiguous sanctuary boundaries, as shown in the Initial Boundary Alternative combined with the Gaviota Coast Extension (Sub-Alternative 5b), because it would provide the most protection.

Our beloved coastal and offshore waters in San Luis Obispo County would be subjected to drilling, dumping, and desecration of sacred sites in alternative boundaries 2, 3, and 4 proposed by NOAA. We request that any cables laid in sanctuary waters have permits from the Office of National Marine Sanctuaries. Migrating marine animals need safe passage through our waters.

Lisamu, which we call Morro Rock, needs protection so that never again will we take rocks from this sacred site. Our indigenous neighbors have wisdom to share based on 10,000 years of living in harmony with the land and waters. We support strong collaboration among local agencies and tribes in regulating and managing the sanctuary to include all interested local tribes.

A Quaker Christmas Message George Amoss Jr. / December 24, 2009 NOTES

Christ Climbed Down

from His bare Tree this year and ran away to where there were no rootless Christmas trees hung with candy canes and breakable stars Christ Climbed Down
from His bare Tree
this year
and softly stole away into
some anonymous Mary's womb again
where in the darkest night
of everybody's anonymous soul
He awaits again
an unimaginable
and impossibly
Immaculate Reconception
the very craziest
of Second Comings.

Those are the first and last stanzas of Lawrence Ferlinghetti's poem, "Christ Climbed Down." The poet's understanding of a particular (and peculiar) dogma may have been off — the "Immaculate Conception" doctrine refers to the conception of Mary, not to that of Jesus Christ — but that's not the worst of his heterodoxies, at least from broadly accepted Christian perspectives. For many Christians, the implication that the more important birth of Christ is that which he awaits "in the darkest night of everybody's anonymous soul" is something one might expect to hear from an incorrigible heretic — from, say, a Quaker.

Our Quaker tradition reads stories in scripture as pointers to inward events. In a Quaker reading of the annunciation narrative,2 each of us is an anonymous Mary in whose dark heart-womb the seed Christ abides. Christ, the seed promised to Abraham3 and the image — Gk. $eik\bar{o}n$ — of God-who-is-love,4 is the promise, or "principle," of divine life, waiting within to re-animate us with its own life and thus to be born into the world. But, as Isaac Penington has warned us, that living seed is easily missed or rejected.

For though this principle be all life, yet it is at first but as a seed, and the appearance of the Lord in it is but as in a seed; very little, low, weak, hard to be discerned, easy to be overlooked and despised, and some greater and more undeniable appearance expected.5

We don't recognize the seed because we don't expect to find the most powerful truth of our lives in something small and frail, almost invisible, apparently worthless or even undesirable. Our expectation is that a divine epiphany will be awe-inspiring and self-validating. But a tiny, seemingly powerless seed of sacrificial love? Not what we're looking for.

Yet that despised seed, covered by our inner darkness, is the "secret virtue [i.e., hidden power for good] and stirring of the life in [the] heart."6 And when at last we feel that seed; and when, understanding its nature and offer, we respond with our "fiat,"7 allowing it to grow to fullness in us: then is the birth of God in human flesh—in our flesh. Then is the coming of Christ in power,8 "the very craziest of Second Comings."

It is the seed of God, and it is the very nature of God; and [a person] in whom it springs, and who is gathered into it, born of it, and one with it, partakes of the divine nature. Peter speaks of the great and precious promises, whereby the saints are made partakers of the divine nature. All the promises are to the seed of promise, to Christ the Son of God, to the seed of God, to the heirs of life and salvation in Christ; and they are all fulfilled to them, and enjoyed by them, who are ingrafted into, and one with Christ, the seed; which cannot be, but by the grace, by the truth, by the light, life, Spirit, and power, which he sows in the heart; which are not many things, but all contained and comprehended in the one seed.9

Earlier generations of Quakers, perhaps more attuned than we are to that living inward promise, refused to erect "rootless Christmas trees," symbols of spiritual rootlessness resulting from our ignoring or despising the life of kenotic love glimmering in the depths of our hearts. And of course they refused to erect crosses and crèches, which divert our gaze from the living icon of love, the inner Christ, to physical and conceptual idols. 10 As Jean-Luc Marion tells us, the idol stops our gaze at itself, occluding the horizon, and then, mirror-like, returns our gaze to us in a spiritual narcissism; but the icon inverts that process: in the icon, the invisible "opens in a face that gazes at our gazes in order to summon them to its depth."11 Christ, the seed of love in the heart, is "the *eikōn* of the invisible God." Through that divine image, the invisible power and nature of God engages us and changes us into that which we behold,12 so that we may become the *eikōn* of love for others.

Therefore we direct our attention not to an idol-symbol but to the living icon, the seed of God, the small stirring of love in our hearts. Sensing and consenting to the seed's quickening in our spiritual wombs, we become *Theotokoi*, God-bearers — truly an "Immaculate Reconception."13 May our Advent, the season in which we can only acknowledge our longing for the saving birth of love in and through us, come swiftly to its end: may Christ take flesh in us today. May this be the Christmas day on which we say,

Christ climbed down from His bare Tree.
