The Meeting opened with silent worship.

CLERK'S REMARKS

- The purpose of our meetings for business is to seek the Spirit's will for us as a community. We are here to worship and not to get through an agenda.
- If you want to suggest that we take some time for worship or take more time between speakers, please say, "Clerk, can we have some time for silence" or use the Time Out sign.
- Being a clerk is a role assigned to one or two people, but clerking is a bunch of behaviors that we all can engage in, and I hope we all will.
- We leave room for Spirit to come through, releasing our thoughts, judgements, opinions and becoming silent inside and out. We can hand our issues to Spirit/God/Jesus, and then settle into any

sensations or messages coming through.

QUERY: The co-clerk noted that the Nisenan, the indigenous people of the Sierra foothill region where Grass Valley is located, start each meeting with a prayer to the ancestors, asking that we make them proud. How can our meeting today be in line with the practices of our Quaker ancestors? Our co-clerk remarked that if she treated the meeting for business as a meeting for worship that this would make our ancestors proud. Others spoke to:

- Continual revelation ~ Our Quaker ancestors would be happy that we are participating in practices that honor indigenous people.
- A Friend spoke to the love that lets everything drop away except for God's love. If we can do that in our meeting for business, that is the way we can draw on that deep well.
- "All My Relations" is the ending of an indigenous prayer that echoes our commitment to seeing that of God in all things.

Clerk's Call to Pacific Yearly Meeting Annual Session July 23 to 28, 2021

Love and Justice: Heeding the Spirit's Power Within and Among Us

As this is being written, we are holding a deep concern for the epidemic of racism—systemic and overt white supremacy in our country. The COVID 19 epidemic and global climate crisis have also greatly impacted Friends this year and many in our community have experienced loss, uncertainty and ongoing grief. And yet we know that these affect Friends in our Yearly Meeting in markedly different ways. Both COVID 19 and the climate crisis disproportionately affect Friends in the Black, Indigenous, People of Color (BIPOC) communities. We are called to move toward love and justice.

The virtual Annual Session 2021 of Pacific Yearly Meeting will be held July 23 to 28. Our keynote speakers are **Avotcja Jiltonilro**, a poet, storyteller and multi-instrumentalist from Strawberry Creek Friends Meeting and **Gabriela Portillo Alvarado**, a second-year college student at the University of Pennsylvania and a Young Adult Friend from Sacramento Friends Meeting. These two women will share their poetry and will engage in a dialogue on the theme.

Together we will take the time to connect with the Power of the Spirit within us. The indwelling Spirit connects us to one another and to all of creation.

This interconnectedness requires us to reevaluate how we relate to one another. The dominant culture within our country and our Religious Society of Friends of the Truth has centered whiteness for too long. What acts of love and justice are necessary for us to re-center our Society to a place of justice, of love, for all? How do we begin to move from entitlement to humbly giving our energy to a different way of being? How do we grow our abilities to cherish one another and develop a culture of dignity within our Yearly Meeting and beyond? Ongoing learning, truth telling, and willingness to repair are needed to break the bonds of racism. Each of us can see a portion of Light, but we need all of us to see the way forward, guided by Spirit.

Right Sharing of World Resources Thanks in advance, Judy Hamilton



I am your representative for Right Sharing of World Resources (RSWR). This non-profit Quaker organization seeks to provide resources to marginalized women in India, Sierra Leone, and Kenya to empower their decisions to improve their lives and the quality of life for their communities. In most cases this takes the form of providing a grant am or loan to establish a business or service to generate income.

loans are paid back as the enterprise brings in money and the repaid funds are then lent to other groups or organizations in the community. For example, in Sierra Leone, many villages have been decimated by the Ebola virus and a two-year quarantine (!), leaving numerous widows and orphans with no means of support. RSWR gave a grant to one village's association which enabled a group of women to start a business making and selling soap. This has given the families more food security and enabled the women to send their children to school. In India, there are many women and men who work as indentured servant in brick-making operations. RSWR has worked with this population to buy out their terms of service and help them start up their own businesses.

The stamp program is the primary means by which GVFM contributes to this organization, although any donations are appreciated (contact https://www.rswr.org/share-your-abundance). Our long-time member Bob Barnes was a member of the RSWR board for a time and brought the stamp program to our Meeting. When he passed, I took it over as a tribute to Bob and all the good work he had done through his life.

The stamp program is run three or four "stamp savvy" folks in the main office of RSWR who sort and sell stamps to collectors all over the world. In 2019, the program bought in \$2,400. The program used to take only U.S. stamps but now accepts foreign stamps, new stamps, and stamps from collections. For stamp collections I have the following instructions.

Sending albums or album pages can be expensive and because there are only a few stamps per page, it's better to remove the stamps if they are mounted on pages. Cutting around each stamp is possible but is complicated by the location of stamps on the back of each page. If the stamps are mounted on pages with hinges just pull the stamps off the page. The hinge will either stay on the stamp or stay on the page. Either way, send the stamps!! If the pages are joined by cellophane tape and the tape covers a portion of stamps near the hinge it will cause discoloration of those stamps, making them unusable.

If you are saving stamps from letters you receive, just cut around them leaving a 1/8-to-1/4-inch border. These can be brought to the Meeting once we are finally there in person. Help create a history of John Woolman School by Paul S. Jolly





History of John Woolman School 1963-2016

Sixty years ago, a group of Quaker and like-minded families came together with the dream of creating a Friends residential high school on the West Coast and purchased a 300-acre ranch in the Sierra foothills. From 1963 until 2016, John Woolman School offered students academic instruction in the Quaker tradition of peace, justice, simplicity, cooperation, and an amazing experience of life close to nature.

Now, a group of alumni and friends of the school are joining to capture the stories of this unique experience, and the doors it opened to lifetimes of service, creativity, and social change.

The book will be written by Cathy Lenox, a Woolman alum from the early 70s and a professional writer, based interviews with alumni and former staff. She will be assisted by Lisa Frankel, a long-time neighbor of Woolman who has helped the school in various capacities. Both the four-year school and the Woolman Semester will be included.


The first step is to ensure that we have enough funds to see the project to completion. We have launched a Kickstarter.com campaign to generate the funds, with a goal of \$24,000. As of February 12, 30 sponsors have pledged \$4,600. If do not reach the goal by April 1, Kickstarter will return the funds to the sponsors.

Although the project is independent of the Sierra Friends Center, all proceeds after the book's expenses will be donated to SFC.

I got involved because my junior and senior years at Woolman, '77 and '78, helped me come out of my shell, gave deep roots to my Quakerism, solidified my life as a poet, gave me a lifetimes worth of dreams about manzanita forests and the Yuba River, and made me comfortable with cooking in a community kitchen. Sir Arthur Stanley Eddington: Scientific Genius, Philosopher, and Quaker Mystic

Synopsis

Sir Arthur Stanley Eddington, astronomer, physicist, and mathematician, was a major scientific mind of the twentieth century. He was also a Quaker whose faith and convictions shaped his scientific work. During World War I, refusing to demonize Germany and German science, Eddington remained connected to the work Einstein was doing on relativity and gravity. In 1919, the photographic plates he made of a total solar eclipse provided proof for Einstein's theory of relativity. Don Vessey provides an account of Eddington's life, thought, and of his faith as a member of Cambridge Jesus Lane Meeting.
