We were reminded that we cannot donate to specific line items in the budget, only to designated funds and the General Fund.

We have yet to pay our annual dues to College Park Quarterly and to Pacific Yearly Meeting. Plus, in March our spending exceeded the contributions received. This is enough to cause your Treasurer to ask for - *help*.

More income is needed. The good news is that since October 1^{st} the contributions received (\$7,875) have exceeded the spending from our General Fund (\$6,765), thank you.

Overall, we need a little increase in income. Our bank balance is still strong from the year when we did not pay rent (other than for the storage container).

Nisenan Land Acknowledgment

We acknowledge the Nisenan people are still here among us today, though they are nearly invisible, and their story continues to be excluded from history.

We understand we are on Nisenan land that was never ceded, and the original tribal families have yet to recover from the near genocide of their people.

As a resident or visitor in Nisenan land, we support the Nevada City Rancheria Nisenan tribe in efforts to stabilize their people as well as the campaign to restore tribal sovereignty through federal recognition.

May 21, 2023, Spirit Life Program: Living and Worshipping as Quakers on Nisenan land

presented by Marilyn Guida and Dorothy Henderson

The meeting house of Grass Valley Friends is located at Sierra Friends Center in Nevada City on Nisenan land, land that was never ceded. Over the past two years, we have been educated about what this means to the Nisenan and to our meeting.

In this presentation we will offer a brief recap of where we have come, and then open ourselves to where we might be going. We will use Worship-sharing queries to explore how and where our faith and practice, our spirit and witness, is leading us.

Proposal from Spirit & Witness: Grounding our Witness in Spirit

When a person or group in our Meeting has a nudge or leading to take action out of a spiritual discernment, the Spirit and Witness Committee is available for support.

These are the steps we suggest for those wanting to step forward into outward witness.

- 1. Bring the concern to Spirit and Witness: Email the S&W clerk and/or members of the S&W committee a description of the concern and any actions being discerned.
- 2. If part of the action is to form a group, the person with the concern can bring that request to the announcements part of Meeting.
- 3. If a group forms, it can become a Witness Committee under the care of S&W. This is similar to Care Committees, Clearness Committees, etc. The committee reports to S&W each month and their report becomes part of the report to the Meeting for Business.
- 4. The Spirit and Witness Committee clerk can post to the email tree, newsletter, Facebook page, etc on behalf of the Witness Committee

The Public Hearing for re-opening the Idaho Maryland Mine is scheduled at Rood Center in the auditorium Wednesday, May 10 from 9 am to 5 pm and Tuesday, May 11 starting at 9 am and going until finished.

You can get more information at <u>www.NevadaCountyCA.gov/IMMRISE</u>. The mining company that has been working on securing this permit is Rise, and their campiaign they call "Rise Grass Valley Project." The local organization that has spearheaded to not issue them a permit, so the mine could not be reopened, is MineWatch, that has a webpage and is on Facebook.

Through the county sight, you can also submit a public comment in writing that will be included with all the spoken comments May 10th and 11th.

As bombs dropped on towns in Ukraine last February, people all over the world wanted to help in any way they could. Knitting for Peace is <u>Seaville Friends (Quaker) Meeting's</u> response to the loss currently experienced in Ukraine. We send them our love, our Light, and beautiful handmade gifts to keep them warm in the freezing months. We want them to know that they are not forgotten, and that they are important and supported by gifts of our hearts.

We can do that through our partnership with the Cape May County non-profit, <u>Cape May Shelters Lutsk</u>. Lutsk is a city near the Polish border where Cape May resident, Vesna Palifrova's brother manages a shelter for Ukrainian refugees. As the violence continues, Zoran and Tatiana's role has expanded to assisting others throughout the country. Over the past year, <u>Cape May Shelters Lutsk</u> has provided them with donated funds, medical supplies, food, heaters, solar-powered lamps – and a thousand hats, scarves, and blankets knitted throughout Cape May County.
