Welcome Committee holds the "connect with Quakers" organizations: Ben Lomond Quaker Center (BLQC), College Park Quarterly Meeting (CPQM), Friends General Conference (FGC), Friends World Committee on Consultation (FWCC), Pacific Yearly Meeting (Pac YM), and Sierra Friends Center (SFC).

Each month, a member of one of the two committees prepares a report on one of their committee's organizations based on the queries below. The committees alternate months, with odd months going to one committee and even months the other one. That gives many people the opportunity to "discover" Quaker organizations, and to hear from different people so that we all get to hear from each other. How can Friends get involved if they feel inspired?

■ When New York City's libraries announced they would eliminate late fees, they hoped residents would return books they had borrowed shortly before the pandemic. "I am 75 years old now and these books have helped me through motherhood," wrote one patron. "They became family."

The Peace Testimony and Ukraine April 1, 2022, By Bryan Garman

The Russian invasion of Ukraine has shaken us all. Innocent civilians have been killed, suffering has worsened, negotiations have failed. Governments around the globe are condemning this depraved military maneuver and are collaborating to defuse it in ways that seemed impossible only a week ago. We hold the citizens of Ukraine and all victims of war in the Light....

QUNO (Quaker United Nations Organization)

The Quaker United Nations Office (QUNO) is a non-governmental organization representing the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers) at the United Nations in Geneva and New York City. Parent bodies of QUNO are the Friends World Committee for Consultation (FWCC), American Friends Service Committee and Quaker Peace and Social Witness. WCC holds consultative status with the United Nations Economic and Social Council, and the Quaker UN Offices in New York and Geneva operate on behalf of Friends worldwide through this status. The offices work closely on issues of Human Rights and refugees, peace and disarmament, human impacts of climate change, as well as peacebuilding and the prevention of violent conflict.

In June 2013, Andrew Tomlinson and Jonathan Woolley, Directors of the New York and Geneva offices, were listed jointly by Action On Armed Violence, as one of the 100 most influential global actors in armed violence reduction. [6]

Nurturing the Seed

On my recent trip to Africa to make a film for Right Sharing I came to understand this: the grants we give to women are seeds that they nurture, grow, and share. The women of the Kassai and Sengbe villages in the Northern Province of Sierra Leone showed me how God's love flows through acts of generosity.

This group of women applied for a Right Sharing grant in 2018, when the chief of their village was a woman. They used the funds to seed a rice field. They told me right at the beginning when they planted the rice they had an incredible harvest. From their overflow they took 7 bushels of rice seeds and gifted them to a neighboring group of women, so they could plant that rice and start their farming. That group did it, and they in turn gifted it to another group. At the end of the cycle of gifting, over 60 women were positively impacted. When we arrived at the villages, the women were all wearing matching outfits to show their pride and unity.

They took us on a short hike to their rice fields to show us how they harvest. The gifts we're given by God, either materially or spiritually, are not for holding onto.

We're all sharing our gifts and doing our part – our gifts only become valuable when we pass them along. Samson Ababu and Pauline Musinga, Field Representatives in Kenya, say in their trainings: "This is Seed money – you are planting it, harvesting it, sharing it and helping it grow." The seeds of love are grown by our women partners and from their overflow passed on in their communities and families. When you give from your overflow, the outcomes are more far- reaching than you can know.

My visit with our partners in Sierra Leone and Kenya helped me understand our partners' deep commitment to continuing generosity. The seeds are for planting, and the overflow is for sharing. With abundant gratitude Jackie

THE UNDERGROUND RAILROAD PAINTING



The Underground Railroad painting (1893) was painted by Charles Webber. It shows abolitionists helping slaves escape to Canada. The abolitionists are Levi Coffin, Catherine Coffin and Hannah Haydock; the other abolitionists and the slaves are unnamed. The scene takes place at Levi Coffin's farm outside Cincinnati in mid-winter. The work was first exhibited at the Chicago World's Fair and created a sensation. Inspired by the painting, Wilbur Henry Siebert wrote The Underground Railroad from Slavery to Freedom, the earliest scholarly book on the subject. The painting is in oil. It hangs now in the Cincinnati Art Museum.

Levi Coffin, a Friend, was known as the "President of the Underground Railroad" and assisted over 3000 slaves to escape. Catherine Coffin and Hannah Haydock, also Friends, were active in the Underground Railroad, too.

The Underground Railroad painting is a stirring, epic work. Charles Webber, a friend of the Coffins, also participated in the Underground Railroad. Fascinatingly, the man holding the horses' reins resembles a self-portrait of Webber. He may have painted himself into the picture.

Quakers and Boarding Schools for Indigenous Children in the U.S.

Quakers founded and operated at least 30 day schools and boarding schools on Indigenous nations' lands beginning as early as 1796. After 1819, when the "Indian Civilization Act" was passed by Congress, some received federal funds. Collaboration with the federal government after 1869, with the launching of President Grant's "Peace Policy."

The Peace Policy was initiated in the wake of the Civil War, when the federal government faced continuing wars to drive away or "contain" Native peoples. President Grant's plan, strongly supported by Quakers and other Christian bodies, was to assimilate Native peoples into the ways of White settlers, by instructing their children to leave traditional ways behind.

From the 1870s to the 1960s, the federal government ran a system of on and off-reservation boarding schools, designed to permanently separate Indigenous children from their families, their tribal nations, their faith, their culture, and their Indigenous identity. Most of these schools are now closed; some are under tribal management, and a few are still operated by the federal government. Click here to read about:.

Written during WW2, on the wall of a cellar, by a Jew in the Cologne concentration camp.

"I believe in the sun even when it is not shining And I believe in love, even when there's no one there. And I believe in God, even when he is silent. I believe through any trial, there is always a way But sometimes in this suffering and hopeless despair My heart cries for shelter, to know someone's there But a voice rises within me, saying hold on my child, I'll give you strength, I'll give you hope. Just stay a little while.
