It was noted that the budget includes funds that will help us to complete our collection of Pendle Hill pamphlets, represented by the total in the Stewardship Committee budget. There is a new fund, the Technology Fund, that will accrue by \$250 per year until it reaches \$1000, in order to address the needs of the meeting. It was clarified that donations to the Meeting can be designated for the various funds outside of the General Fund (for example, the Sharing Fund); however, line items in the General Fund cannot receive allocated funds outside of the budgeted amounts.

The budget will be brought back in the October meeting for worship for business for approval.

Become an instrument of peace. At every opportunity, be peacemakers in your homes, workplaces and communities. Steep yourself in the power of the universal Spirit. Examine your actions for the seeds of violence, degradation and destructiveness. Overcome the emotions that lie at the root of violence and nurture instead a spirit of reconciliation and love. Come to know the oneness of all creation and oppose the destruction of the natural world.

- Do I live in the virtue of that life and power that takes away the occasion of all wars?
- How do I nourish peace within myself as I work for peace in the world?
- Do I confront violence wherever it occurs, even when my personal relationships are involved?
- Where there is distrust, injustice, or hatred, how am I an instrument of reconciliation and love?
- What are we doing to remove the causes of war and destruction of the planet, and to bring about lasting peace?
- Do we reach out to all parties in a conflict with courage and love?



A memoir of a Quaker activist and master storyteller on his involvement in struggles for peace, civil rights, LGBTQ rights, labor justice, and environment. His life will be the subject of a new documentary film coming in 2022.

From his first arrest in the Civil Rights era to his most recent during a climate justice march at the age of 83, George Lakey has committed his life to a mission of building a better world through movements for justice. Lakey draws readers into the center of history-making events, telling often serious stories with playfulness and intimacy.

In his memoir Lakey describes the personal, the political, <u>and</u> theoretical -- *coming out* as bisexual to his Quaker community while known as a church leader and family man, *taking action* against the war in Vietnam by delivering medical supplies through the naval blockade in the South China Sea, and *applying his academic study* of nonviolent resistance by creating tactics for direct action campaigns.

With tactics he learned as a young man facing violence in the streets and risking his life as an unarmed bodyguard for Sri Lankan human rights lawyers, Lakey shows readers how to find hope in even the darkest times through strategic, joyful activities.

An Urgent Call to the Religious Society of Friends Written on: JULY 21, 2022



Philadelphia Yearly Meeting has endorsed the following *Urgent Call to the Religious Society of Friends*. This call to action was authored by an ad hoc group of nineteen Friends, more than half of whom are from Philadelphia Yearly Meeting. In it they share that they see forces at work in our country that undermine some of our basic values: equality of all people, truth-telling, and deep listening.

Christie Duncan-Tessmer, PYM's General Secretary says, "This call represents our Quaker faith in action: It expresses Truth as discerned in the discipline of relationship and prayer; it calls all to examine how this revelation can lead them to witness and act. It offers us all fellowship on a challenging journey."

Read the Call

We Quakers, members of the Religious Society of Friends, hold strongly to the principle of speaking truth with integrity. We ground our speaking truth in our worship and our searching of ourselves, as we listen deeply and honestly within and across all differences. Our testimony to the world includes standing up for spiritually discerned Truth, the equality of all persons, the peaceful resolution of conflicts, and respect and care for our neighbors and the earth. Right now, we see many forces at work in our country and the world that are undermining these basic values. Accordingly, we call on Friends everywhere to act.

In this country, in 2020, we witnessed an attempted coup. The January 6 assault on the Capitol was a deliberate, violent attempt to prevent Joe Biden — the clear winner of the 2020 election — from taking office and keeping then-president Donald Trump in power. To maintain that the last election was riddled with fraud is demonstrably false. This politically motivated movement has now embarked on an orchestrated campaign to suppress voting by black, brown and young people and to pass new state election laws giving the power to

throw out huge numbers of valid ballots to highly partisan legislatures, governors, and state attorneys general. Thus, this lie is being used to deprive people of their constitutional rights and constitutes a major injustice.

As Friends, we feel called to speak out against these falsehoods and anti-democratic actions. We encourage Friends to seek spiritual guidance on any actions that you and your meetings might take to witness against this gross injustice. If this politically motivated movement succeeds in its anti-democratic takeover attempt, any hope of making significant progress on racial and economic justice, the equality of all people, the climate crisis, gun violence, and other urgent issues of our time will be gone.

We know that democracy in the United States has many flaws. During the past 100 years, our local, state and federal governments have acted to prevent formerly enslaved people and other communities of color from voting. It was not until 1920 that women finally won the right to vote, and their equality is still being challenged. We call on Friends to act — first, to resist all efforts to undermine our current democratic processes, and second, to support true democratic reforms to our still flawed election system. We cannot allow a government that is built on lies and injustice.

We the undersigned are encouraging Quakers throughout the country to work in their local communities, states, and the national arena to take critical actions to prevent an authoritarian takeover of our democracy. We urge Friends to discern the deep truths that provide a foundation for active love, wisdom, compassion, and a truly democratic electoral system—and then to actively support such changes. We know that love conquers fear. Let us lean into Divine Love and find ways forward in Truth. On the reverse are two queries for you and your meeting to consider in response to this call. We've also included a list of specific actions that Friends could begin taking now. Some actions may become necessary later if there is another attempted coup during the next presidential election cycle.



BOOK REVIEW: THE PEACEABLE KINGDOM, BOOK ONE, by Jan De Hartog. (218 pp.)



This book presents the story of George Fox's initial meeting with Margaret Fell, and chronicles the lives of the men, women, and children who figured prominently in the first years of the Quaker movement in England. It is written as historical fiction, and is an engaging and often surprising read. I read it expecting to learn about history. I did not expect to learn about the inner experience of Quakers, but I did. Because it is a novel, de Hartog could show in detail peoples' experience of Quakerism and that made this book unusually illuminating. Before reading this, Quakerism always seemed fragmented, but this book showed me how all of Quakerism comes from the recognition that there is that of God in everyone. I learned what "that of God within" means, and how Fox showed that to acknowledge that of God in another is to relate to others as unique individuals—not to relate to them as holders of a social role, like judge or servant. This book earned de Hartog a nomination for the Nobel Prize in literature. – Don McCormick

We seek a world free of war and the threat of war. We seek a society with equity and justice for all. We seek a community where every person's potential may be fulfilled. We seek and earth restored.

Now is the time for citizenship.

Ten years ago, thanks to efforts by immigrant youth and advocacy groups, the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program was created. This was a hard-won step to secure temporary protections for undocumented immigrants who arrived to the United States as youth. But a decade later, DACA recipients and undocumented communities still live with uncertainty and are vulnerable to government aggression. More must be done. The 117th Congress has made legislative commitments to enact permanent protections for immigrants with undocumented status, such as Dreamers, Temporary Protected Status (TPS) and Deferred Enforced Departure (DED) holders, farmworkers, and essential workers. Thanks to our advocacy, congressional leaders are in immigration talks and a pathway to citizenship remains on the mind of lawmakers. We must hold them accountable to deliver permanent protections for our undocumented neighbors.

As we mark ten years of the DACA program this month, we are reminded of our power to create change. Procedural and legislative delay is no longer an option.

Please contact your representatives and encourage them to support our immigrant population who arrived in this country as children, grew up as friends, coworkers and neighbors, and who unquestionably deserve permanent protections.

Trail of Tears: September 16 - National Trail of

Tears Day

The **Trail of Tears** was a series of <u>forced</u> <u>displacements</u> of approximately 60,000 <u>American</u> <u>Indians</u> of the "<u>Five Civilized Tribes</u>" between 1830 and 1850 by the <u>United States government.</u> ^[3]



Part of the <u>Indian removal</u>, the <u>ethnic cleansing</u> was gradual, occurring over a period of nearly two decades.^[4] Members of the so-called "<u>Five Civilized Tribes</u>"—

the <u>Cherokee</u>, <u>Muscogee</u> (Creek), <u>Seminole</u>, <u>Chickasaw</u>, and <u>Choctaw</u> nations (including thousands of their <u>black slaves^[5]</u>)—were forcibly removed from their ancestral homelands in the <u>Southeastern United</u> <u>States</u> to areas to the west of the <u>Mississippi River</u> that had been designated <u>Indian Territory</u>.^[3] The forced relocations were carried out by government authorities after the passage of the <u>Indian Removal Act</u> in 1830.^[6] The <u>Cherokee removal</u> in 1838 (the last forced removal east of the Mississippi) was brought on by the discovery of gold near <u>Dahlonega</u>, <u>Georgia</u>, in 1828, resulting in the <u>Georgia Gold Rush</u>.^[7]

The relocated peoples suffered from exposure, disease, and starvation while enroute to their newly designated Indian reserve. Thousands died from disease before reaching their destinations or shortly after.^{[8][9][10][11][12]}.
