

MINUTES & RECORD

Meeting for Worship on the Occasion of Business 14th Day, Tenth Month, 2018

REPRESENTATIVE AND OFFICER REPORTS

Treasurer's Report: Fosten Wilson gave the report, appended. A Friend suggested that we propose \$1/day per person per day as a guideline for giving to Meeting.

Sierra Friends Center: Reed Hamilton, SFC Liaison, gave the report, appended. Amy Cooke, Director, and Jennifer Dickey, College Park Friends Educational Association (CPFEA) Board member, answered questions about the strategic goals recently approved by the CPFEA Board of Directors.

Placer County Worship Group: Stuart Smith gave the report. They are considering a Wednesday night worship/study group.

SEASONED MINUTES

FINANCE:

From Ninth Month Minutes: We usually have 40 households making contributions, but this year we have 30 households, due to deaths and households devoting resources to care. Finance Committee came to unity that we need to live within our means, so the money in most budget categories has been reduced, and recommends that we replace the Quaker Center Pass with a \$600 scholarship fund. Next year the budget is planned to be \$14,000 plus outside donations. Automatic withdrawal of funds as a way of making donations to the meeting was discussed. It was concerned that our present bank may not meet our current. The budget will be seasoned for one month.

Minute 2018.10.01: Grass Valley Friends Meeting approves establishing a Quaker Center Scholarship Fund of \$600 for 2019, in lieu of maintaining the Quaker Center Pass.

Minute 2018.10.02: Grass Valley Friends Meeting approves the 2019 Budget as attached to these minutes.

NEWSLETTER:

From Ninth Month Minutes: Dianne requested help with the newsletter—especially with regards to its length. There was a discussion of the practice of posting some items to the web. It was suggested that a survey about this be sent to people who receive it by mail. Dianne Marshall will contact Charity Bryson about that. One copy of the newsletter that includes all of the reports and other items that are online is placed in the library.

At the end of meeting confusion about this was expressed. It will be an agenda item next month. Held over until 11th month.

ADVICES AND QUERIES†: personal relationships

In daily relationships with others, both inside and outside the home, our lives as Friends speak immediately and lastingly. In these relationships, our faith may also be severely tested. We are called to respond to that of God in everyone: we are all children of God. Friends celebrate any union that is dedicated to mutual love and respect, regardless of the unique make-up of the family. We strive to create homes where the Spirit of the Divine resides at the center and where the individual genius of each member is respected and nurtured.

Human sexuality is a divine gift, forming part of the complex union of body, mind and spirit that is our humanity. In a loving adult relationship in a context of mutual responsibility, sexuality brings delight, fulfillment and celebration.

The presence of children carries a special blessing as well as responsibility. Children bring unique spiritual gifts — wonder, resiliency, playfulness and more. Recognize and honor the Divine Light within children and treat them with the dignity and respect that is due to all people. Listen to and learn from children; share with them those values and practices that are central to our own lives. Special care must be given to resolving problems between adults and children in a manner that gives equal weight to the feelings and needs of both children and adults. Tender parenting is one of the critically important peace vocations in our society. Make every effort to offer all parents the personal and institutional support that this challenging work requires.

Take a strong stand against any form of abuse, whether that abuse is minor or severe, and whether it is emotional, physical or sexual in nature. The terrible impact of abuse on the most vulnerable members of our families creates lifelong suffering for its victims and is a major source of violence in our society. Perpetrators are themselves usually victims of similar violence and should be approached with compassion as well as firmness.

Do I make my home a place of friendliness, joy, and peace, where residents and visitors feel God's presence?

Are my sexual practices consistent with my spiritual beliefs and free of manipulation and exploitation?

What barriers keep me from responding openly and lovingly to each person?

Do we open our thoughts, beliefs, and deep understandings to our children and others who share our lives and our hospitality?

Do we provide our children and young adults with a framework for active, ongoing participation in the Meeting?


Youth Programs Coordinator Position Description

Youth Programs Coordinator and Youth Programs Coordinating Committee: One of the most important concerns of this vital cell ought to be for the spiritual nurture of the children and youth of the meeting. ... When do our Quaker families begin to train their children in the significance of silent worship and communion? We are in a world beset with noises... If ever the spirit needed to be calmed and deepened with the reality of God, it is now. ... But the slow formation of spiritual ideals and counter attractions which build the soul and shape the character come only through patient and painstaking nurture. -- "The Vital Cell," Rufus M 11 Jones, 1941

For many years PYM has been concerned with involving young Friends in the life of the Meeting: helping them to stay connected between sessions, and helping Meetings that have children, teenagers, and young adults meet these Friends' needs.

The Youth Programs Coordinating Committee hires and provides ongoing supervision of the Youth Programs Coordinator, an employee of Pacific Yearly Meeting, and participates actively in envisioning and supporting programs and activities. This committee also stewards the use of interest income from the Bob Vogel Endowment.

The Youth Programs Coordinator builds the capacity of youth and adults to run their own programs and serves as a resource for Meetings (local/Monthly, worship groups, Quarterly, Yearly) and Quaker organizations within PYM. In working with individuals, groups, and committees of all ages, from time to time the Coordinator and the YPC Committee act as a catalyst for new programs and activities. The YPC does not typically take charge of running programs and activities themselves.

DEL REYNOLDS' MEMORIAL MINUTE:

On August 31st, 2018, Delbert Reynolds closed his eyes one last time and left this world, at the age of 97. Del was born in 1920 in Wilmington, Ohio, to Craig and Blanche Reynolds. The high points of his childhood were the summers spent on his relative's farm, and the violin lessons his mother insisted upon, determined that her boy would be more than just a farmer. He was by his own account a mischievous child, until a protracted bout of tuberculosis rendered him bedridden for two years, instilling in him a love of reading and a thoughtfulness that lasted his entire life. Upon his recovery he began attending the Wilmington Quaker Meeting.

Del graduated from college with a master's degree in philosophy, and was hired at the Friendsville Academy in Knoxville, Tennessee, where he immediately fell in love with a lovely first year teacher named Julia White.



By December they were engaged and on June 2, 1950 they were married at the Bethel Meeting House in Franklin, Virginia. They would remain married for the remaining 68 years of Del's life.

Following an interest in the Holy Land lit by one of his professors, the young couple left in June of 1951 to teach at the Friends Schools in Ramallah, Jordan (now part of the occupied territories of Palestine), but within a year the Director of the School abruptly left and Del found himself conscripted as Director of the Boy's School. It was a position he performed with dedication, shaping the lives of countless young Palestinians.




Spirituality is increasingly acknowledged to be an essential part of child development. David Hay argues for the inclusion of spiritual awareness as a cross-curricular element in the school syllabus to promote the development of morality and social cohesion.

While culturally constructed pressures and the decline in institutional religion have led to the suppression of spiritual expression, children are, the author maintains, capable of profound and meaningful beliefs from an early age. A three-year research study into young children's spirituality and its survival value informs Hay's view that spirituality in education needs to overcome traditional approaches and should adopt a theory of spirituality that includes religion but is not confined to it.

This stimulating book will encourage educators, parents and others involved in teaching children to consider new approaches to foster children's natural spiritual development. by Marjorie McKelvey Isaacs. Photography by Eugenia M. Mills

Finding the Light In You supportively guides the process of nurturing children's silent worship skills. Guided imagery, richly illustrated with color photos, provides a bridge from abstract adult silent worship to child-sized conversations with the Inner Light of God. In this practical handbook, Marjorie supportively explains how to help children create their own safe inner space for silent worship activities like giving thanks, asking for divine help, and appreciating creation in nature. Originally prepared for Friends, the approach is nonsectarian, and offers a variety of activities in a flexible format. With this guidebook in hand, teachers can make quick preparations. The book makes ongoing support available moment by moment while working with children. Adults generally enjoy the activities, and there is ample explanation and reassurance to help teachers get started, as well as address difficulties that sometimes come up along the way. An easy-going style is brightened with interesting true stories, and occasional touches of whimsy. Bright Silent Worship gives clear explanations and caring practical support to anyone who wants to help children discover their own stories, visually create an internal safe place, and experience the Light within all of us.
